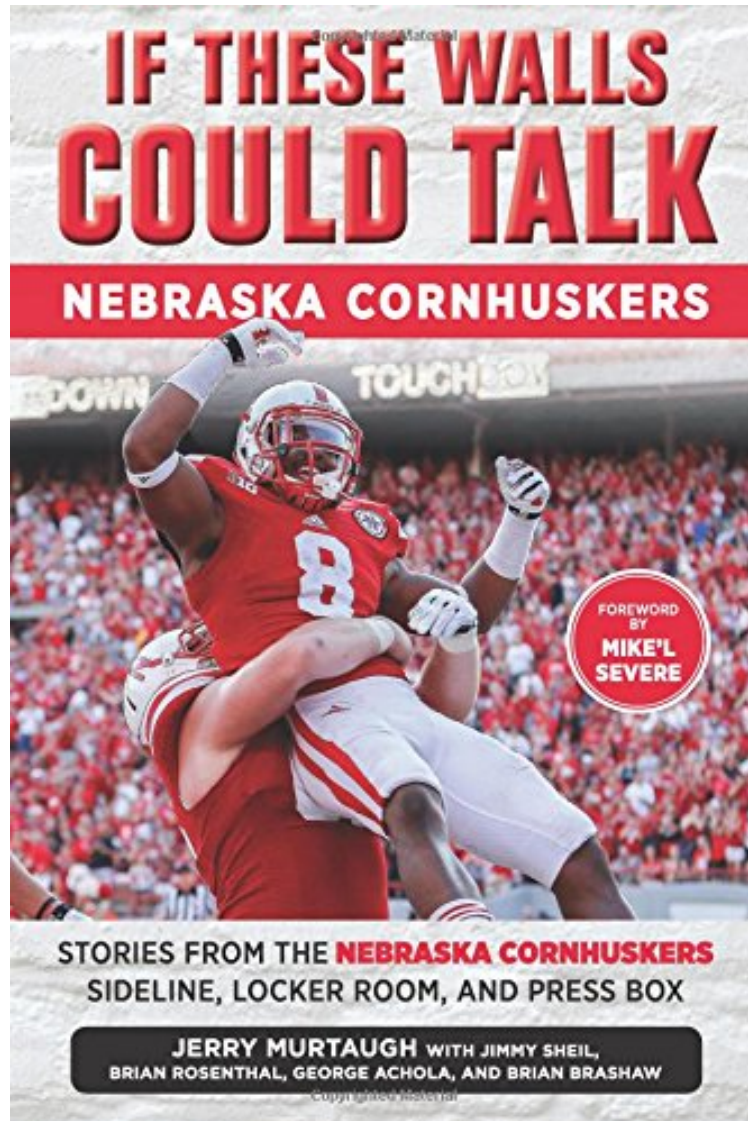

HornA decent book which shares stories about 21 former Cornhusker football players. There are four chapters about Jerry Murtaugh, who played for the Big Red from 1967 to 1970. Murtaugh's stories are somewhat humorous, as he shares his conflicts with coach Bob Devaney. Four people contribute to the writing of this book. Some of the stories are very insightful -- depending on who wrote the chapter of the featured player. On a somewhat critical note: I would liked to have heard more out of Murtaugh concerning the 1970 National Championship team and his memories of that special season. That chapter is only five-and-a-half pages long which includes two photos that each take up half a page. I also believe the cover of the book could have been a bit more nostalgic rather than Ameer Abdullah being hugged by a fellow player. All in all, the book is a good read, but it did not live up to my expectations, considering it's headline "author" was Murtaugh, whose only true written contribution was the introduction.
