I first discovered "Color Country" a few years ago. I am a diehard fan of the visual drama that characterizes the American West, and no one has provided me with souvenirs (in the French sense of the term: tangible memories) of my most precious experiences as has Susan Neider. In "Some Like It Hot," she captures the almost unearthly colors, textures, and explosive moments of Yellowstone National Park's geothermal features. In seeing this collection, I marvel at the beauty our country is so fortunate to have within its borders, and I renew my gratitude toward John Muir and T. Roosevelt who recognized that humans at their best, and at the most, are stewards of the earth, not exploiters. Initially I thought, when I learned that Neider had produced a volume of photographs of Yellowstone's geysers and fumaroles, that it surely has been done before. Astonishingly, I cannot find that it has. Then I thought, OK, but Yellowstone is so darned photogenic, it is almost cheating to produce a photographic collection with it as a subject. Even I have taken beautiful shots there, and I am no photographer. But, I was wrong about that, too. Neider's collection is far more than a series of scenes. Indeed, views like "Beehive Geyser with rainbow," and "Giant Geyser with rainbow," and "Mud Caldron" with the stippled sky mimicking the steamy mud demonstrate her unparalleled ability to capture not only scenes but moments; her patience must be immeasurable, or her luck, but certainly her sense of "now." I am willing to bet that Neider could produce a book about her home state of New Jersey, and it would be so beautiful and interesting that I'd want to go and explore! At the cover price of \$19.95, and 's discounted price, this book is a steal. I predict it will very soon be in its second printing. The only thing keeping this gem from perfection is the microscopic size of the page numbers. My guess is that the publishers didn't want anything to interfere with the visual beauty of this book, including numbers at the bottom of the page.
