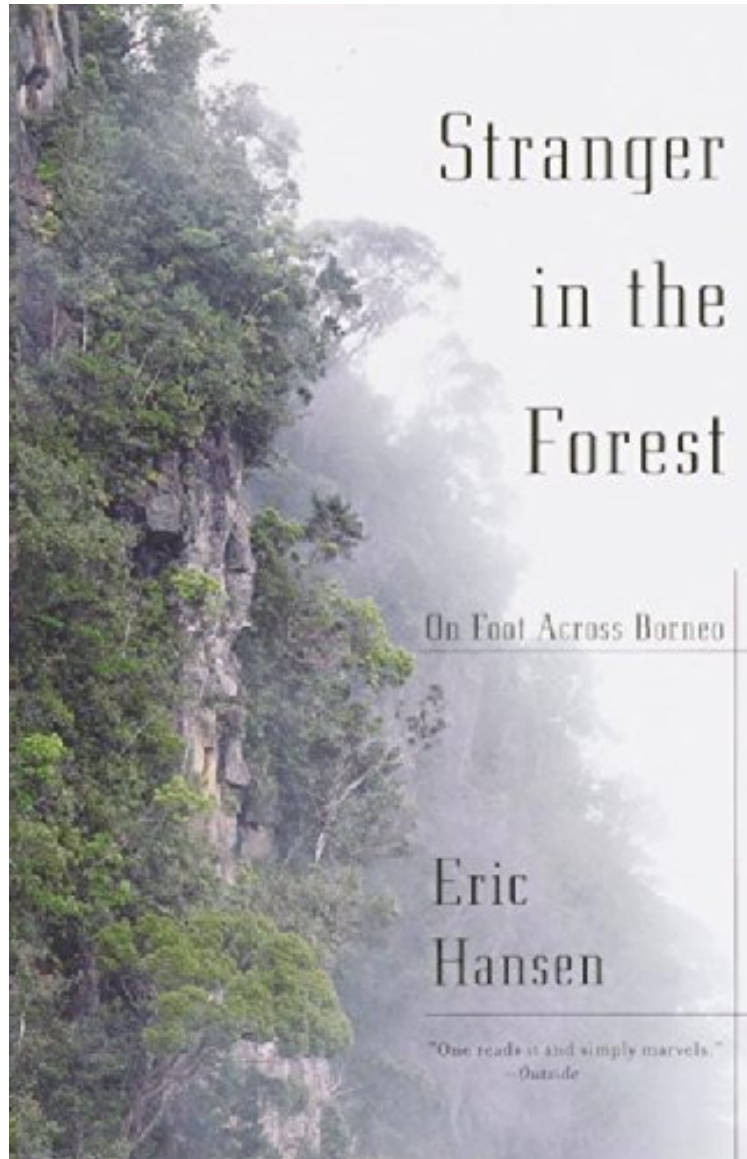

The attempt by this sentient humanoid (Eric Hansen), who is unskilled in basic outdoor survival, let alone in a dense tropical rain forest, to walk across Borneo is riveting. His adaptability to conditions turns out to be his lifeline and his willingness to become near native in the process stands out in my mind.

The vivid descriptions of the relentless trek with its exceedingly difficult challenges for an American city boy are captivating. You can hear the jungle sounds, feel the sticky heat, swat at the insects, eat food way out of your habitual comfort zone, and meld with strangers upon whom you must now depend for safety and guidance over great distances and many weeks of travel. The book transformed my thinking about survival as an art form. We don't have any opportunity to master these skills anymore in modern life, much less describe them adequately to anyone else. This book is a treasure of information about taking care of the body in an extreme environment and at the bravest edge for a western man today. Beneath the rain forest canopy, they trekked through a hauntingly beautiful jungle where snakes and frogs fly, pigs climb trees, giant carnivorous plants eat mice, and mushrooms glow at night. At once a modern classic of travel literature and a gripping adventure story, *Stranger in the Forest* provides a rare and intimate look at the vanishing way of life of one of the last surviving groups of rain forest dwellers. Hansen's absorbing, and often chilling, account of his exploits is tempered with the humor and humanity that prompted the Penan to take him into their world and to share their secrets.

From *Library Journal* Hansen's adventurous walk across Borneo took place in the 1980s, but the forest and culture that he encountered have changed little during the past century. Though he documents his reactions to isolation and to the tropical forest environment and its culture, he is not successful in describing the indigenous people or the forest; a more sophisticated treatment would have enriched the reader's experience. Despite this weakness he conveys the drama of the adventure, not least his navete in undertaking such an effort with such little planning. James R.
