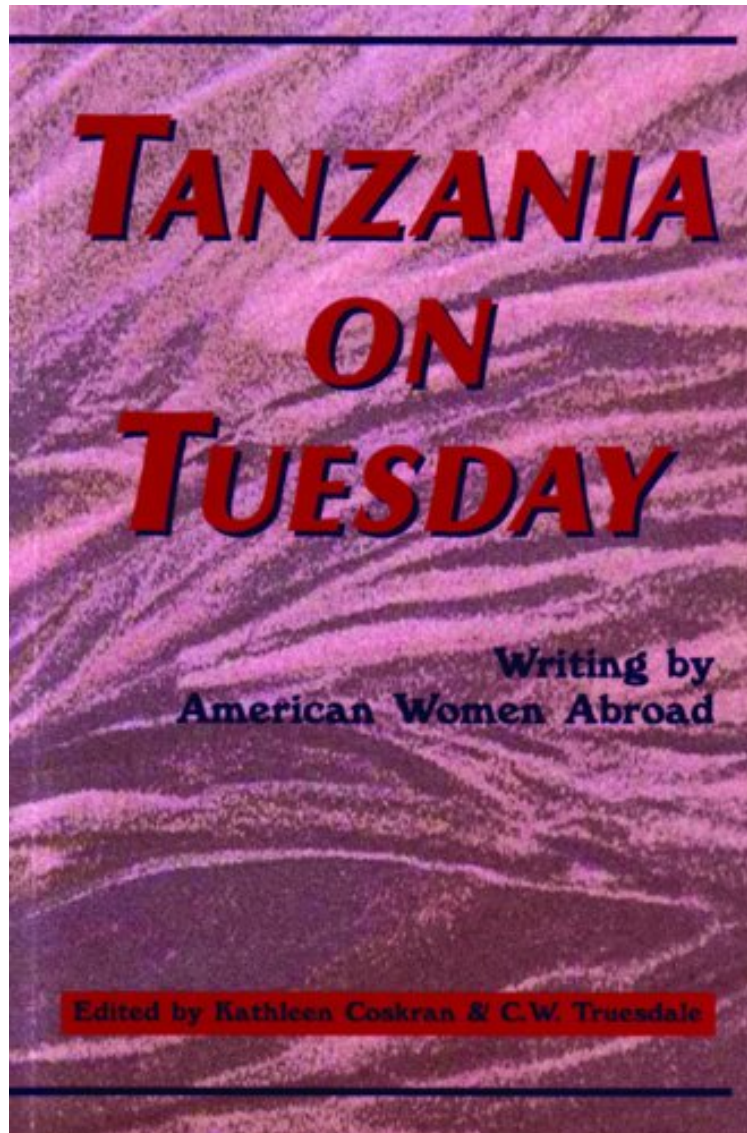

As one of the anthology authors in this book, Jeanne D'Haem, I was surprised at how well the stories fit together. This is a book about innocence and trust, something children and women travellers frequently experience. When you are not in control of events you learn another equally important skill, to be fully aware in each moment. This does not mean that you lose sight of your goals, as my story, *Tanzania on Tuesday* shows, but you must embrace the journey. I almost called this story *Serendipity on the Serengeti* but I could not spell it so I used an alternative like *women who hitchhike* because there is no bus.
