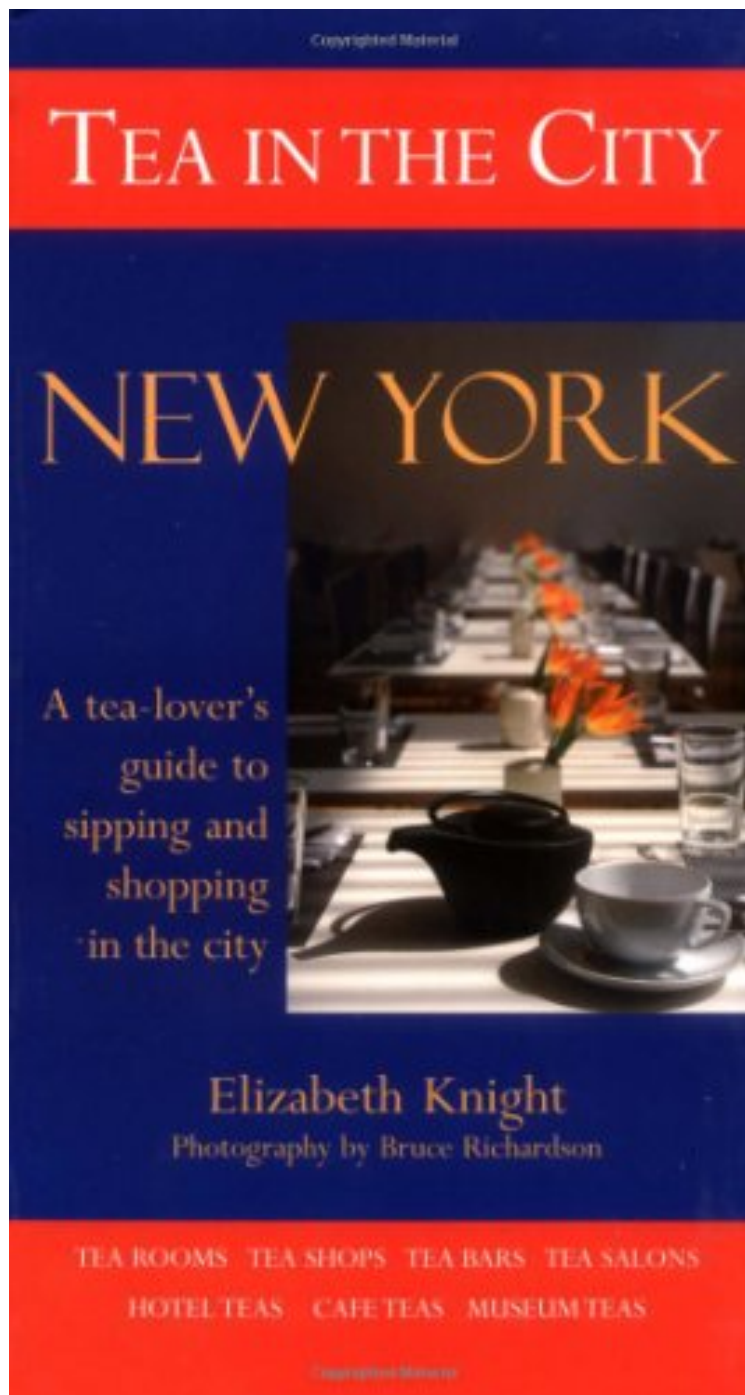

Just to name a few T emporium, the Point Knitting cafe, Danal, Knit New York, Wild Lily Tea room, the tea box and Salon tea have either closed completely or moved. This book needs a 2013 update.
