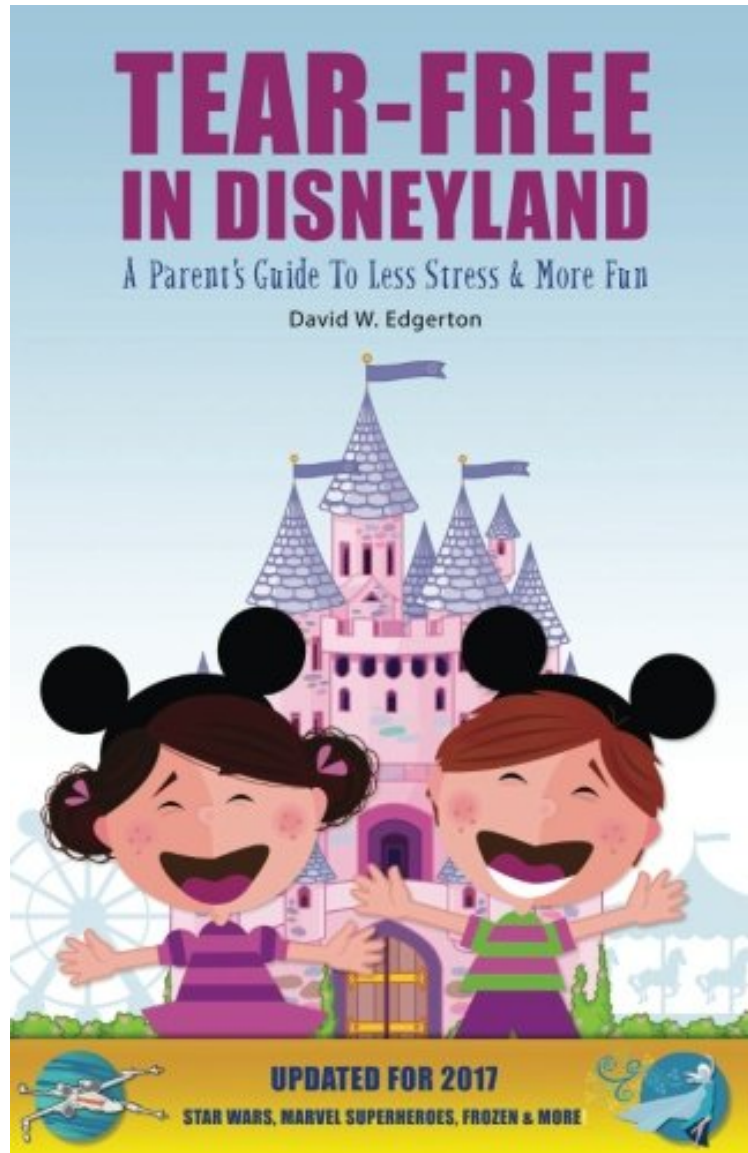

We just got back from Disneyland and I must say you can not see everything in one day. You need 2 days at each park to see most of it. Do take breaks it does make a difference. When you go if you want to get autographs from Frozen head there first thing. The line is at the end of Main Street, you wait there till the park opens. We got to the park early and got up front to be let in. They only let a few in at a time before opening. Go through the castle gate and on the left just before the carousel is where the line starts. We waited 1 1/2 hrs but it was worth it to see the girls eyes light up. We took pillow cases, small clip boards and fabric markers for the princess to sign so the girl's could sleep with the princess on their pillow. The Color of Wonder and Fantasmic are great to see, if you do take a nap or break and go back to the park to see the excitement. We also had a special needs child with us. Go to City Hall right away to get a pass to allow you to get the child through the line faster. Our child could not stay in line for long periods of time. Only problem is you have to run to get to one of the sign off places in order to get in line faster. Some times the fast pass is great like Radiator Springs and other times you get through faster without it. It is nice to have. There are only 2 places in both parks to get it signed off. If you are a first timer, celebrating a Birthday or Anniversary go to the City hall in Disneyland or Guest relations in California Adventure to get a pin to commemorate the occasion.
