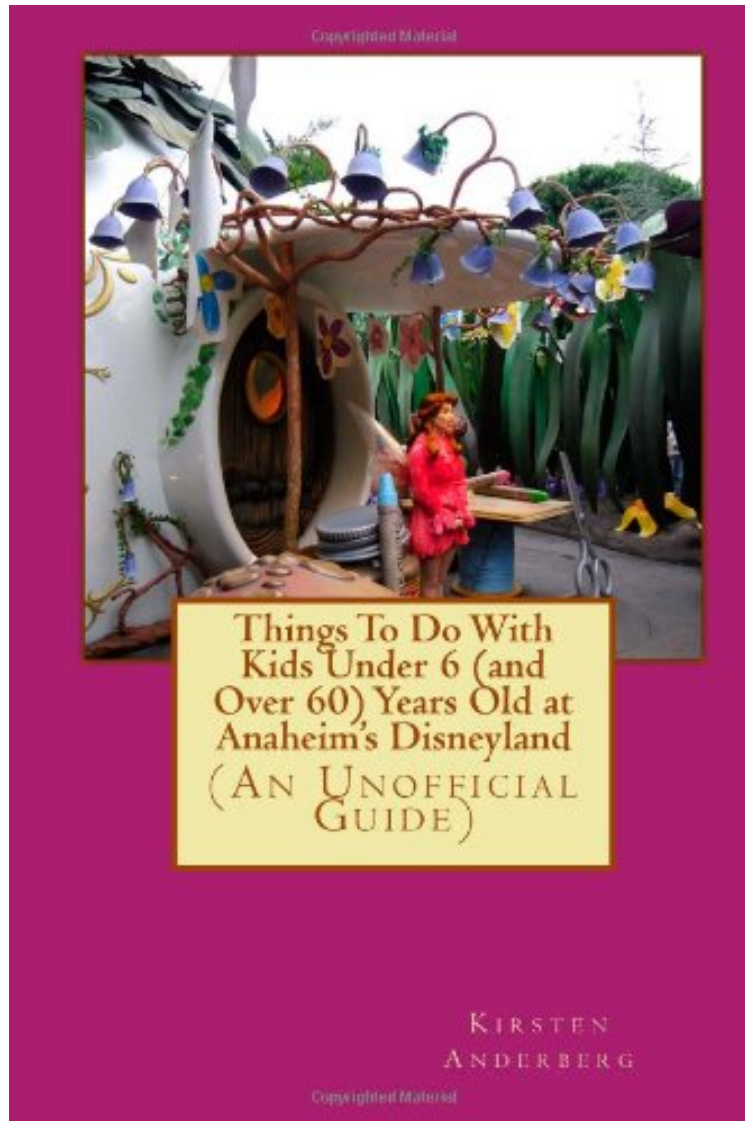

I would not consider myself a frequent Disneyland traveler. I went as a small child, then as a family trip at 22, then with my kids in 2011 in my late 30s. When planning a second trip, I decided to check out this book to see if, for 4.99, the author had some suggestions I hadn't found in ready the attractions on the Disney website. It was about a 20 minute read, and largely consisted of a list of rides and attractions that the author felt appropriate for small children. There was a brief paragraph on each, but less detail than on Disney's website (to which the Kindle version is linked repeatedly). Frankly, for 5 dollars, I expect more detail than I can get going to the Disney website, or than I know from 2 trips in the past 20 plus years. There were even some glaring factual errors - for example, at Location 190, the author speaks about Buzz Lightyear's Astro Blasters, which she describes as as looking like "a bunch of planets spinning in space. Parents must accompany kids on this ride as it goes up in the air. I do not recommend it for really small kids" and talks about how kids can shoot a laser beam at different objects as their cars turn and swirl in the air. The ride with a bunch of planets spinning in space that goes up and down is the iconic Astro Orbiter, at the entrance to Tomorrowland, and is a separate ride from Buzz Lightyears Astro Orbiters, which is a dark ride/shooting gallery. The fact that the author conflates these two makes me wonder if she has ridden the rides in question, or just read about them. She also mentions repeatedly that you can get free admission on your birthday - this was promotion around 2009, but had ended over a year before the publication date of this book. I would not recommend buying this book. Very short, very little detail that you can't find elsewhere, and factual errors that make it difficult to take much of what's said at face value. Want to find a quick healthy snack or a bathroom with shorter lines? What happens when kids get lost? Can I rent a stroller on site? What about our family dog on vacation with us? Are there lockers inside the park? Where can I get a personalized kid's parasol while sipping a non-alcoholic mint julep and eating a Mickey-shaped Beignet?
